Students applied and were selected for this all-expense paid trip, based on their interests, accomplishments, and potential to pursue a STEM-related career path after graduation. This hands-on learning experience involves students conducting group science, math, and computer science technology research projects with award-winning scientists from one of the largest U.S. Department of Energy research facilities in the United States.


"market." The best motivation of all was that the students kept their profits! From churros to enchiladas, piñatas to sangrias, the day was fun and delicious.
