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I would like to thank our residents for approving the 2023-2024 Falconer Central School budget. A passed budget allows us to plan for the next school year with confidence. The Board of Education has been able to continue to provide the highest quality of education during a time in which aid has been an unknown factor. I would also like to thank our Board of Education for providing goals, challenges, and direction for the education of our students during very difficult economic times. Congratulations to

Mark Wilcox and Heather Cardot for being elected to our Board of Education. Over the last few weeks our District has held many award ceremonies recognizing and celebrating the achievements of our students. The most significant event in June is, of course, our high school graduation. Parents, faculty, administrators and members of the Board of Education gather to congratulate our students from Falconer Central School as they cross the stage to accept their diplomas on June 22 on Bill Race Field at 6 p.m. As seniors attend the final activities as members of the Falconer community, I wish each of them much success and happiness as they begin their new journey.

The Falconer Central School District can take pride in the accomplishments of the Class of 2023. They have excelled in the classroom, stage, field, court, mat, and community. From the first day they entered school, the Class of 2023 has met the challenges set in front of them. We are proud of all they have done at FCS and look forward to all they will accomplish. They can be assured that their diplomas represent a significant and meaningful education delivered by an outstanding faculty. Our students are well prepared and ready to enter this next phase of their lives.

I would also like to thank the FCS community for their support of the \$18,650,000 District Capital Project referendum that was approved on May 16. The District anticipates the use of Capital Reserve and Unappropriated Reserve funds to allow it to fund this project with no impact to the tax levy. The project will likely commence in part during the summer of 2024 for the replacement of roofs that have reached the end of their useful life. Much of the remaining work, which would likely commence spring 2025, includes upgrades to classroom and rooftop air handling units at each of the District's buildings, extensive renovations to the MHS Auditorium, MHS physical education, and team locker rooms, renovations to the MHS guidance and nurses' suites, upgrades to the Fenner Elementary STEAM classroom, and masonry work at the bus garage.

FCS received two grants from the Falconer Region Community Fund at the Chautauqua Region Community Foundation in the Spring 2023 cycle.

The first grant is for the purchase of two aeroponic garden towers from the high school Career Development and Occupational Studies (CDOS) class. Over the past few years, the CDOS class has undertaken multiple initiatives related to gardening and agricultural endeavors. They work throughout the year in the school greenhouse, have aquaponics systems in their classroom, have worked with a local composter, and partner with Key Club in working in the school garden. The aeroponic towers will provide an opportunity to learn more about growing vegetables year round. With the towers, the class will also receive lesson plans and supplies needed for one year of growing leafy green vegetables and then preparing them for meals.

Hello from the Middle/High School Health Office! As we come to the end of another school year, I wanted to send out some reminders.

1. We will be doing Sports/School physicals on Thursday, August 3 from 8:30-10:30 a.m. in the nurse's office. Please call if you would like your child(ren)'s physicals completed here. There is pre-paperwork that needs to be filled out and signed by a parent/guardian and brought with the student on the day of the physical.

2. For any student that takes medications at school, please pick up their leftover medications by Thursday, June 22. Any medications not picked will be disposed of on Friday, June 23.

- Students entering 6th grade will be required to have a Tdap vaccine.
 Students entering 7th grade will be required to have a Meningococcal vaccine and an updated physical.
 Students entering 9th grade will be required to have an updated physical.
 Students entering 11th grade will be required to have an updated physical.
 Students entering 12th grade will be required to have a 2nd Meningococcal vaccine.

- 8. Hearing and vision screening is required in grades 7 and 11 and will be completed by the School Nurse if the physician does not complete them during their yearly physical.

The second grant is to supplement a Cummins grant received earlier this year to support the purchase of a DroneBlocks RoboMaster TT class set for middle school STEM classes. The purchase includes curriculum, lessons in Block, Python, Open-CV and JavaScript Coding, teacher training, a drone coding simulator and 10 drones with necessary accessories and 200 replacement propellers. While the drones will primarily be used in middle school, they are appropriate for a range of ages. Currently, the Fenner STEM courses use a simpler version of drones, and 5th graders learn the basics of operation and landing with remote control. Programming drones provides the opportunity for students to explore computer vision and machine learning and produce surprisingly creative/artistic work in terms of light and motion. Drone coding supports the NYS Computer Science and Digital Fluency Standards implementation for Computational Thinking in Grades 4 - 12. In addition, working with drones in teams can help students develop career-essential skills of collaboration, communication, critical problem solving and persistence.

Chautauqua County Shredders - New Regional Team

Students entering grades 6 to 12 are invited to join a new interscholastic mountain bike team for students in Chautauqua County. The Shredders will participate in the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Cycling League (PICL), a division of the National Interscholastic Cycling Association (NICA). All students in Chautauqua County will ride with one "composite" team. The team focuses on riding skills, socialization, maintenance, and trail stewardship. Many local rides

will originate at Loud Performance in Bemus Point, and local races will occur in mid-July through August. PA state races occur in September-October. This is not a school-sponsored sport, but a great regional opportunity. More information is available at Loud Performance in Bemus Point, NY (wfdippel@me.com) and on the PICL website (PAMTB.org).

Middle School Rides Mountain Bikes Through Grant

Falconer Middle School physical education classes are riding mountain bikes for the first time, thanks to a grant award from the Outride Riding for Focus (R4F) program. R4F promotes cycling as an outlet for students to improve their cognitive, physical, and socio-emotional well-being. At the end of the program, "...students become certified as "Road Ready" after they have gained the knowledge and learned the skills to cycle safely. As a highly effective physical education program, Riding for Focus also seeks to support students in their physical, emotional, and social journey. Riding for Focus provides the program implementer/s with tools to teach physical literacy so students can develop a value in physical activity for its health benefits, social interaction, self-

expression, and personal enjoyment" (from the R4F 2022 Program Preface). The District applied for the grant in the spring of 2022, and received the bikes this past fall. There was quite a bit of prep work to complete before riding could commence, including building the bikes, building a storage unit, training the teachers, acquiring helmets and making sure all

permission slips were turned in. Physical education teachers Brittany Brace and Tommy Fales have stepped up to the challenge of being project champions. They received intensive training in the R4F curriculum and now are implementing the program with students in grades 6 and 7 during their regularly scheduled physical education classes. The grant program lasts for three

years, after which the 30 Specialized Rockhopper bikes will be available for the school to use for P.E. and extracurricular activities.

Some of the students have never learned to ride bikes, so this experience for them has been particularly challenging and rewarding. During one of the recent lessons in P.E. class, Mr. Fales commented, "Today it seemed like the kids who were really afraid of the bikes on

Tuesday were starting to gain confidence." Miss Brace wasn't available for comment, as she was leading the more confident riders as they followed her path on the field.

The grant award was a true community effort, including assistance from the following organizations: Fund for the Region at the Chautauqua Region Community Foundation supported the in-house design and construction of a bike rack to store the 30 mountain bikes in a limited footprint; Falconer Region Community Fund at the Chautauqua Region Community Foundation and the St. Luke's

Thrift Shop each supported the purchase of additional helmets so bikes could be used by all students during Physical Education classes; Eric Chapman of Upstate Cycles in Lakewood, NY, program partner bike mechanic and bike shop. Upstate Cycles built all of our bicycles, advises on routine maintenance and provides major maintenance; Kristian Reiber of Next Level Mountain Biking, and Dee Dippel of Loud Performance, both lead members of the Western NY Mountain Bike Association; acting advisors on the project for initial coaching and coordinating ideas around long-term plans to eventually ride off campus

In addition to teaching students safe riding techniques, R4F has the potential to start students on a path towards a life-long hobby in cycling and mountain biking. The County is rich in well-maintained trails and home to a strong cycling community, which Falconer students will now be better equipped to enjoy.
