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Our District has made considerations over the past several years to provide for the educational and financial stability of our community. Given the continued uncertainty of resources we receive from the state, we have had to work very hard to maintain staffing and programs without creating harmful cuts to student educational opportunities, all while living under the imposed tax levy cap. We continue to deal with the learning loss effects of COVID-19 for our students and staff. With our community's support, we've been able to provide those needed services and support for our students to help them adapt back to school. We're also focusing our efforts on providing a safe school environment by adding School Safety and Security Officers in all three buildings for 2023-2024.

We will continue to respect and stay below the allowed tax levy increase cap which will allow our taxpayers to be eligible for the state's tax rebate programs. We expect that the soon-to-be-enacted NYS budget will allow for no increase in the 2023-2024 tax levy for our community. Although the foundation aid formula has been fully restored this year, and aid projections have increased this year for FCS, we have, over the past 10 years, been shortchanged over \$42 million in foundation aid.

The Board of Education has also adopted a resolution to place a reconstruction project referendum on the ballot for \$18.65 million. Much of the project will address reconstruction and maintenance issues such as replacing "out-of-warranty" roofs, fire alarm replacement at MS/HS, complete renovation of our auditorium at the MS/HS, upgrading HVAC control systems, replacing air handling uni-vent systems, addressing bathroom renovations, boiler replacements at both Fenner and Temple, STEM lab renovations at Fenner, replacement of the backup generator at Fenner, renovations to our nursing suite, guidance, and business office spaces at the MS/HS, reconstructing the locker rooms and adding more outside access bathrooms at the MS/HS, upgrading district kitchens in all three buildings, as well as repairing/constructing other items addressed in our five-year building construction survey. New York state aid generated by the project, along with capital reserve money and available balances acquired through the prior year's fiscal balances, will enable the project to be completed without impacting district taxes.

We will continue to share services with our neighboring Districts and municipalities that will generate cost savings for all involved. Our area school district's consortium continues to provide our District with important savings through special education and distance learning programs. Falconer Central School will continue to investigate all areas of cost savings for our District taxpayers while still providing the highest quality of education for our students during an era of increased efficiencies. We truly believe that our two most important responsibilities are offering our students excellent educational opportunities while charting a financially sustainable long-term course for our schools.

**2023-2024 Proposed Budget**

The 2023-2024 Budget will provide the necessary resources for our students to attain the knowledge required to meet the standards necessary to reach higher education and work goals. Upon adoption of the New York State budget, we expect additional State Aid will provide the District adequate funding to levy a tax equal to the tax levied in the preceding year.

**Program Component**

The program component of the budget represents the cost of providing an appropriate education to all students of the District. It includes salaries and benefits of teachers and supervisors who spend the majority of their time teaching; instructional costs of supplies, equipment and textbooks; co-curricular activities; interscholastic athletics; and transportation operating costs.

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Studies Traits

Third grade students are learning about inherited traits. Students are investigating how traits are passed down from parents to their offspring by building clay creature offspring. Students use a set of guided trait characteristics to see which traits were inherited from the parent creatures. They used these guides to create their creatures. They then compared and discussed similarities and variations between the offspring. Next, students worked in groups to make the clay creature offspring with specific traits based on instructions randomly inherited from the two parent creatures. During a class discussion, students applied their growing knowledge and, at the same time, deepened their understanding of inheritance and traits.

### The Audubon Visits Fenner

The classroom visits from the Audubon have tied in nicely with our science unit, as students have learned that the environment, or the humans in the environment, can impact bird populations in our area.



### 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Studies Beavers

The 4<sup>th</sup> graders learned about beavers with a visit from Miss Katie from the Audubon. The kids enjoyed the hands-on lesson. They were able to touch real beaver fur and skulls.

will continue to Set Sail with Reading, by making reading together a **daily** habit!





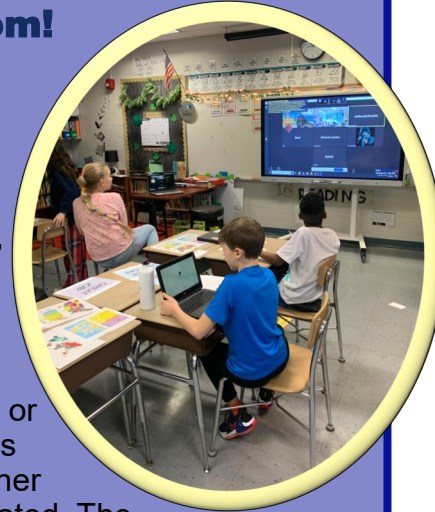
## 5th Graders Visit Temple

## Game Night

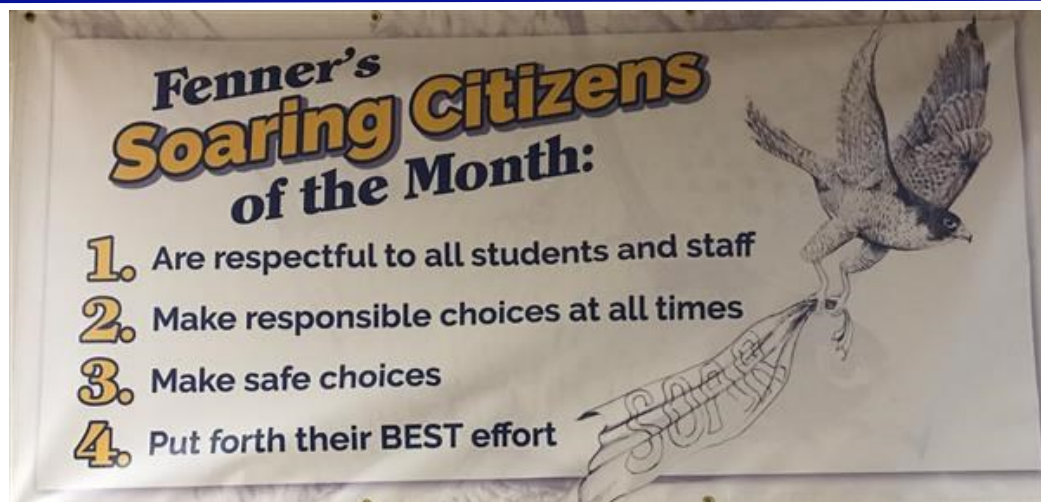

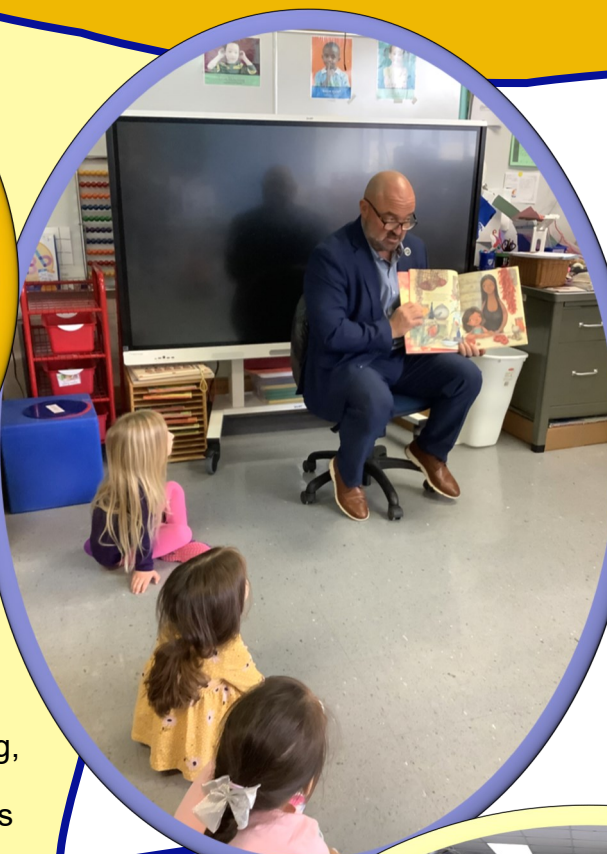
